

### **Federal Relations**



# David Fancher Federal Relations Chair Retired

The House of Representatives and Senate have passed a 1.9 trilliondollar relief package. By the time you read this, the House should

have voted to concur on the changes the Senate made in the bill. It passed the House along party lines with two democrats voting in opposition. It also passed the Senate on a party line. This package includes 170 billion dollars for K-12. To give you an idea of how much funding this will be to Alabama, take the Title I budget and multiply it by seven. These funds will have short term and long term uses. Short term uses include HVAC upgrades, PPE, reducing class size, and hiring more staff. Long term uses include improvement of after-school programs, hiring counselors and nurses, and re-engaging students absent from remote learning. In the Senate this funding for schools was strongly opposed by Republicans. They felt the other two Covid relief bills, passed earlier in the year, provided enough funding for schools to open face-to-face.

The NAESP National Leaders Conference was held at the end of February. Again this year, it had to be held virtually. Arne Duncan was one of the speakers. He did a great job speaking on the challenges facing schools. He made the point that we need to go out and find the 2 million students who have vanished from schools this year. He also spoke about the need for a national tutoring institute to address learning loss. Finally, he reminded principals to take care of themselves and to support each other. Zoom meetings were also held with Senator Shelby and Tuberville's education staff and Congressman Palmer's staff to share the needs of Alabama's students.

Dr. Miguel Cardona has been approved as the Secretary of Education on a 66-33 vote. The new Secretary is a former elementary school teacher and a NAESP Distinguished Prin-

cipal. There is high hope having an educator in this position will change the direction the Department of Education has been moving in in regards to public education.

Senator Tuberville has been appointed to the education committee in the Senate. This puts him in a position to do great things for students across the nation. In his first speech on the floor of the Senate he talked about how important education is. He also spoke on pushing to "get prayer back in schools". Both he and Senator Shelby voted against the Covid relief bill. They both opposed the additional funding to schools among other parts of the bill. Senator Tuberville introduced amendments to the bill that were voted down. Senator Shelby has announced his retirement for the Senate. He will complete the two years left in his current term. He one of the most powerful Senators based on his seniority and committee assignments. You need to let your Senators know what your school and students needs are. There are two ways to contact your Senators:

### **Making it Through the Pandemic**

To begin the school year, I had to share with my teachers that the start of the day HAD to change. I met with the CNP

manager, and we determined how to create 6 feet distancing while children ate breakfast lunch. Seats were marked. We did have all children come to the cafeteria or library as a "waiting area" until 7:30am. That was all before the pandemic. Our new procedure is as follows: teachers clock in and are at the doorways with thermometers to take the children's temperature. Students enter their classrooms AFTER a temperature check, put down their bookbags, and go to breakfast. There is no waiting area. Morning duty has increased to more staff because of all the transitioning children in such a large building with traffic to their classrooms from the bus or car rider line for their temperature check. We are doing it and it is working!

With the change in lunchroom seating, preschool and kindergarten are the only grade levels eating lunch in the cafeteria. All other grade levels eat in their classrooms. The custodians had to create a new system for trash pick up with over 400 trays out at lunch time. They have done an outstanding job!

We are all wearing masks. I usually meet with my staff after school the first Wednesday of each month. I still do, but virtually. I have finally learned how to do breakout rooms so we can still synergize. That has been a learning curve for me!


With our collaboration meetings, I did let the grade levels choose: virtual or in person. Some chose virtual from the very beginning. Now, I meet with all grade levels virtually making sure we don't violate 6 feet so-

cial distancing.

Parents are not allowed to come in and eat with their children. No volunteers are allowed in the building unless absolutely necessary. That has been VERY different.

However, our attendance is the highest ever! Discipline is the lowest ever! Parent communication is the most consistent and involved than most teachers have ever experienced! Our nurse has shared she can count the flu cases on one hand when we usually have a high number. We have not had multiple episodes of stomach viruses or any types of cold in the building this year.

It has been a unique year. We have one teacher in kindergarten, first grade, second grade, third grade, and fourth grade that are virtual teachers. I meet with them every Friday. They are a part of TWO teams: their grade level team and the virtual teacher team. The technology growth in these teachers is UNBELIEVABLE! They are making it happen!



### **CLAS Board Meeting**

The CLAS Board met in Prattville on December 8, 2020 and the meeting was opened by Donald Turner, who was presiding in the President's place.

About a third of the Board was in attendance, another third were virtual and unfortunately, a few caught the virus! We hope those who were sick are well and feeling great!

We started the morning with **SDE updates given by Dr. Jeff Langham**, Chief of Staff Assistant State Superintendent, for Dr. Eric Mackey who was in quarantine. Luckily, his COVID test was negative, yet as the rules go, he was still in quarantine. What an amazing update we received today from Dr. Langham! He is always a great speaker and bearer of mostly great news! He began answering the question,

### "What will the 2nd semester look like in the schoolhouse world of COVID?

A little history as we close the first semester of 2020...Per the United States Department of Education (USDOE) a waiver was granted to the ALSDE, there will be no Accountability System produced in the fall of 2020.

Schools kept their letter grade from the fall of 2019. Support statuses will not be updated in the fall of 2020.

- The Accountability System will be back in place in the fall of 2021 as the USDOE waiver was granted for only one year.
- NAEP has been postponed. (YAY!)
- The current expectation for other Spring of 2021 assessment is that we will administer them as planned...Testing, here we come!

Schools without a Grade 12 - which is most of us....indicator weights are:

- Academic Growth 40%
- Academic Achievement 40%
- Chronic Absenteeism 15%
- Progress in English Language Proficiency 5%

#### **BUDGET UPDATES-FY21**

Appropriations from 2020 COVID Session - Act 2020-169 appropriated \$7.2 billion from the ETF for the support, maintenance, and development of public education

Supplemental appropriation for the ETF are:

- .8 million for expansion SOR training to support the Literacy Act
- \$2.7 million for additional regional math coaches and trainers
- \$250,000 for school safety liaisons per ALEA region
- \$1 million for a marketing campaign for teachers
- \$2.5 million through the Alabama Supercomputer Authority for K-12 school cybersecurity and IT support of which \$1 million will be spent to provide specific professional development for all education

employees on digital security.

#### **CARES ACT Education \$ -**

- GEER \$48 Million (12 months to spend)
- ESSER \$216 Million (Obligated by September 2022)
- CRF \$1.8 Million (had to be spent by December 31, 2020)

Dr. Langham shared that Dr. Mackey and the whole department was very appreciative for all the challenges and opportunities we have endured on the front lines and for all we are doing to reinvent teaching for our students!

The last budget item that Dr. Langham discussed was the **Request for the 2021 Legislative session...** 

- Increases Requests: ACCESS-Distance Learning, Advanced Placement, Teachers in Residence (TIRs), Building Based Coaches for LS1 schools, Literacy Act (Before/After School Tutoring, Science of Reading/Multisensory Strategies PD, ELL Specialists, and CALT Stipend Program, Computer Science, High Needs Special Ed Grant Program, Online High-Speed Teacher Certification Protal, Mental Health Service Coordinator Program, Career Tech Initiative, Gifted Students Program, Jobs for Alabama graduates, Marketing Campaign for Teachers, National Board for Professional Teaching Standards, Special Ed Pre-K Progrma, Special Ed certified behavior analyst program, Special Ed licensed interpreters/deaf, HOH teachers, and technology infrastructure. \*All other categories are requested to receive level funding.
- Legislative Updates from ALSDE -
  - 2020 COVID Bills including COVID Immunity
  - \* Teacher Bill of Rights
  - \* Student Discipline Bill
  - \* School Board Governance Bill
  - \* Gender is Real
  - \* Open Records
  - \* Vulnerable Child Bill
  - \* Seizure Safe Act
  - Mental Health Service Coordinator (funded, but law didn't pass!)

#### **Possible Legislative Topics -**

- Instructional Materials/textbook law
- Braodband Expansion
- Funding Solution to Hold districts harmless with COVID ADM

Will there be any funding for remediation for failures and deficients for summer schools - We need funds sooner than later! At this meeting, there were no talks of a Raise, yet recent talks seem to be considering one.

Dr. Demica Sanders stating that we all should check CLAS website for PD and 2nd semester activities

Banner Schools - 41 systems 134 schools have applied

### **CLAS Board Meeting Cont'd**

CLAS Convention June 13-16th **blended** conference - in Birmingham - we will be the first group in the new hotel in downtown Birmingham! Many wonderful speakers are on the agenda!

Legal Defense fund - half through the budget - Not as many superintendents and principals, yet costs are pretty equal to last year at this time.

COVID law suits coming - Strong suggestion to have documentation for attending to prove that our people are trained.

#### **Action items - Donald Turner**

Membership report shared - we are down 125 about where we were last year -have found that many did not return

Calling all Affiliates to communicate with those who did not renew to increase our members!

AAESA 21 down. If we go below 651 we would lose a board seat.

**Financial report - Guest David Galahar** from Raymond James - we are in good shape with CLAS income from an investment standpoint. David shared the most recent statements:

Performance statement 70% fixed income and 30% variable Projected income 827,000=18,000 interest Over 5.2% 5.94% this year. +13,000 this year

#### CD -

Lower rates - It's hard to get a good % on CDs these days Jenny Mae govt. bonds - Market is as strong as it has ever been!

Tax revenue is UP even with COVID up in our systems - Question is, "Will it continue and what has caused it?" Lots of online spending and with the Alabama Sales Tax Law passed a few years ago, we don't lose all the online sales tax!

People are still spending \$, business owners are still spending \$, PPE \$ being spent, new grants from the state are out there and will be available

**Executive Director Report - Dr. Vic Wilson** - He began with the heartfelt comment that, "He is astonished by the amount of work we all are doing, and especially the CLAS Staff." There is a new database at the CLAS office - working out kinks to make sure our #s are accurate Membership letters to those who have not renewed will be postmarked by December 31.

Policy positions have not changed - to not touch the ETF. CLAS will be against a possible bill to tax the ETF. Several groups including: SSA, CLAS, AEA, and all oppose.

than ever!

The CLAS/SSA Legislative Reception was changed to the Renaissance in Prattville, yet as we all know, it had to be canceled. Legislative session starts Feb. 2, 2021.

Dr. Wilson - had an opportunity to apply for another grant, yet, CLAS was not eligible because one of the stipulations stated we could not lobby and we do.

Shared information about spam emails - we all need to be careful when opening emails! Make sure you can trust it before opening! Several schools have been affected!

Everyone is worried that in December & January we will see peak covid #s - expected to be very high.

In August, 2020 CLASS accepted the 12th affiliate in CLASS... 504 Coordinators Affiliate. Congratulations to this new affiliate as their first year numbers are very high and close to what their leaders predicted!

CLAS SUMMER CONFERENCE - Vic reiterated that we hope we will have a full face to face conference in June. At this writing, CLAS has decide to offer a blended conference.


Hoping the vaccine is available and works as we enter the second semester of 2020-21!



"You never know what battles people are facing." Show grace. We've all heard the words used to

negative implications.

"Unprecedented."

"Fluid."

"Unsettling."

"Chaotic."

"Stressful."

"New normal."

While there seems to be some light at the end of the tunnel, one truth no one can deny is this: Things. Have. Changed.

A lot.

With all the negativity that surrounds us, it's important to remember that love casts out fear, and optimism is the fuel that can boost morale in the midst of so much bad news.

While no one really knows what challenges lie ahead, the truth is the world is always changing. There will always be issues and problems to face.
